



### **Team Essay – Quick**

The Kings traded their long-time goalie Jonathan Quick to the Columbus Blue Jackets in return for Vladislav Gavrikov, a PR-First5 defensemen these last four seasons, and goalie Joonas Korpisalo, who was having a better season than was Quick. The Blues also picked up a 2024-25 third round pick and a conditional 2023-24 first round pick.

I don't want to say the Blue Jackets were fleeced in the trade, but no other adjective comes to mind. Quick wasn't in Columbus long enough to find a good Denny's restaurant, as the Blue Jackets did the right thing and traded Quick to Vegas two days later. In return the Blue Jackets received goalie Michael Hutchinson and a 2025-26 seventh round pick. In summary, the Blue Jackets converted Gavrikov and Korpisalo into a late first-round pick, a third-round pick and a Denny's Grand Slam breakfast coupon.

But I digress: this article is about Jonathan Quick, not the Blue Jackets. To discuss his career, to compare him to his goalie peers, I could use a goalie rating system. The bad news is that I didn't have one, but the good news is that the bad news is in the past tense: I now have a goalie rating system.

I will not go into the details of the goalie rating system in great detail here, because a goal of these team articles is brevity. The data part involves the number of goals a goalie allowed and the number he was expected to allow, and the more below expectation a goalie is, the higher his rating. The table below shows the categories a goalie can fall into (provided he has been on the ice enough), and various counts from the last sixteen seasons, which are all the seasons for which there is goalie data.

In sixteen seasons there have been 47 GR-Elite seasons. That breaks down to 2.9 GR-Elite per season, and 7.2% of rated goalies being GR-Elite.

Quick has played every season for which I have data. Below is a chart that shows his category counts.

In 2007-08 and 2016-17, Quick did not play enough to qualify for categorization.

Quick was a fabulous goalie from 2011-12 to 2017-18. Looking at Goalie Ratings over the years in a certain way, Quick is one of the five best goalies since 2007-08.

But, starting in 018-19, he has been rated: GR-EBUG, GR-GoodBU, GR-GoodBU, GR-Star and GR-BadBU. This means he was rated as GR-BadBU in 2022023, the year of his trade out



of Los Angeles. In total he gave up 117 goals compared to an expected goals against of 107.69, so he gave up about 10 more goals than expected.

Korpisalo's 2022-23 season was rated GR-Star. It is conceivable that he could maintain or improve on this level of play for at least another couple of seasons. He is eight years younger and has a much nicer moustache. Los Angeles made a good trade to rescue Korpisalo from the Blue Jackets.

Hockey is a tough game to play, and it is a brutal way to make a living. Not only are players subjected to the competition of their peers, they are subjected to the competition of team mates who want their ice time, and they are subject to the declines of old age. There is a reason that Ken Dryden is no longer playing. Goalies grow older and they are no more immune to the associated drop in effective play than Wayne Gretzky was. In hockey, old age starts in the early thirties.

As a signoff, I would like to note that the goalie rating system used in this article is in its nascent stage, and is subject to modification. In a future article, GR will be properly introduced.
