




### Team Essay – A Little Too Little

Although Nashville was playing meaningful games late in the season, you cannot be a playoff team with three third lines and no first-line or second-line level output.

Nashville's lack of productivity extended to the defense: all three defensive pairs were below league average, shocking when you remember the Predators have defensemen named Roman Josi and Ryan McDonagh.

This team-wide lack of strength is reflected in the team's return from play, which is what their players were worth based on their play. Nashville was 28<sup>th</sup> in the league.

As seen on the Lines and Pairs chart above (looking at the thinner red bars that represent Nashville), the difference between their top "line" (L1) and their fourth "line" (L4) is slim. That difference is the smallest in the league. Montreal is ranked just below Nashville in their top three lines but had a much more normal distribution of productivity (as shown below).




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Having three roughly equal lines is a good thing if you do it properly. While Nashville was 1<sup>st</sup> in the league in the first-line to third-line difference, Seattle was 3<sup>rd</sup>. But Seattle is working at a completely different level (as shown below). Seattle's success this season is not just related to their first three lines: check out their defensive pairings.



Nashville missed the playoffs with three third-lines and a slightly below average defense. Seattle made the playoffs with three second-lines and a very good defense.

Seattle has proved that you can do very well in the NHL without excellent first-line forwards if you've got a lot of excellent second-line forwards. Nashville has proved that you cannot do well in the NHL with (essentially) no first-line or second-line forwards.
